	 learning about times when Mary and Joseph celebrated (Jesus' birth, the finding in the temple)
	 learning about Advent, especially that it is a special waiting/preparing time for the birthday of Jesus
	 learning and recalling events from the Christmas story

	 be respectful and sensitive to the feelings of others
	 be confident to try new activities, initiate ideas and speak in a familiar group
	have a developing awareness of their own needs, views and feelings and be sensitive to the needs, views
