Summer Term 2026 Curriculum Plan for Parents - Y6H & Y6W

<p>Religious Education</p>  <p>14 FREEDOM OF THOUGHT AND RELIGION</p>  <p>17 ACCESS TO INFORMATION</p>	<p><u>Easter</u>: In this unit, children study the events of Easter from the perspective of Thomas, thinking about reasons why Thomas did not believe in the Resurrection of Christ at first and why people today believe that Jesus is risen from the dead. They will also learn about the promise of eternal life, as well as some associations with Baptism and the celebration of a Christian funeral.</p> <p><u>Prayers in the Lives of Followers of Christ</u>: Children gain a greater knowledge and understanding of the prayers of the Church and some of the signs and actions associated with prayer. The unit will be concluded with a study of some customs of prayer in other religions.</p> <p><u>Celebrating the Life of Mary and the Saints</u>: Children will explore some of the Church's beliefs about the Blessed Mary and the feasts that are celebrated in her honour. They will also consider why her role is so important.</p>
<p>Maths</p> <p>Explored through Maths projects - managing money in real life situations</p>  <p>26 SOCIAL AND ECONOMIC HELP</p>	<p><i>Review of all areas in preparation for SATs and transition to Secondary School</i></p> <p>The children will be revising their arithmetic skills and applying their reasoning skills to solve problems covering areas of mathematics such as:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • long multiplication and division; • problems involving percentages, fractions and decimals; • ratio and proportion; • problems involving measures; • interpreting and using data; and • formulae.
<p>English</p> <p>Holes: Looking at the historical injustices of the characters</p>  <p>2 NO DISCRIMINATION</p>	<p>· <u>Writing (Composition)</u>: Children will have the opportunity to express their ideas through a range of text types, such as: persuasive writing, recounts and narrative writing. Children will apply the features of the genres studied throughout the year in their writing as well as trying to include a range of sentence types and structures chosen for effect, ambitious and meaningful vocabulary choices, a variety of cohesive devices and a range of punctuation that is used mostly accurately. Children will plan, draft, write, edit and improve their own writing.</p> <p>· <u>Spoken language</u>: Children will engage in discussions in all areas of the curriculum, understanding how to develop responses, varying the length and structure of sentences. They will use adventurous vocabulary, explaining the meaning of words used. Children will be given the opportunity to debate issues and formulate points.</p>

	<p>· Reading and Comprehension: Throughout the first weeks of this term, we will continue to prepare for the KS2 Reading Test, completing past papers and discussing strategies to answer the questions. Children will have the opportunity to explore methods and strategies used in Year 7 through our transition unit.</p> <p>They should read widely and frequently for pleasure and for information, with good understanding, inferring the meaning of unfamiliar words and then discuss what they have read.</p> <p>· Handwriting: Children should write legibly, fluently and with increasing speed using the cursive style of handwriting.</p> <p>· Grammar: Throughout the first weeks of this term, we will continue to prepare for the KS2 SPaG Test, revising grammatical terminology and completing example papers. Children will have an understanding of the main word classes (i.e. nouns, verbs, adverbs, prepositions, etc.), different types of clauses and phrases and the use of passive and active voice. They will also be given opportunities to apply their understanding in their writing - for example, using a suitable level of formality for the purpose of writing and linking ideas across paragraphs using cohesive devices.</p> <p>· Punctuation: The children will continue to develop in confidence and accuracy when using punctuation to mark parenthesis; the use of semi-colon, colon and dash to mark the boundary between independent clauses; the use of colons to introduce a list; punctuation of bullet points to list information consistently and how hyphens can be used to avoid ambiguity.</p>
<p style="text-align: center;">Topics</p>   	<p>Throughout this term, we will be studying a range of different topics, including:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Electricity and Investigation Skills (Science) • WWII (History) • Fairground Rides (DT) • Spreadsheets and e-Safety (Computing) • Painting and Mixed Media (Art) • Cricket and Athletics (PE) • Sikhism (Multi-faith)
<p style="text-align: center;">Homework</p>	<p>Homework will be set on a Monday - in the lead up to SATs, English and Maths homework will be set each week to be completed by the following Monday. After SATs, the children will be set project tasks that will link to our topics.</p>
